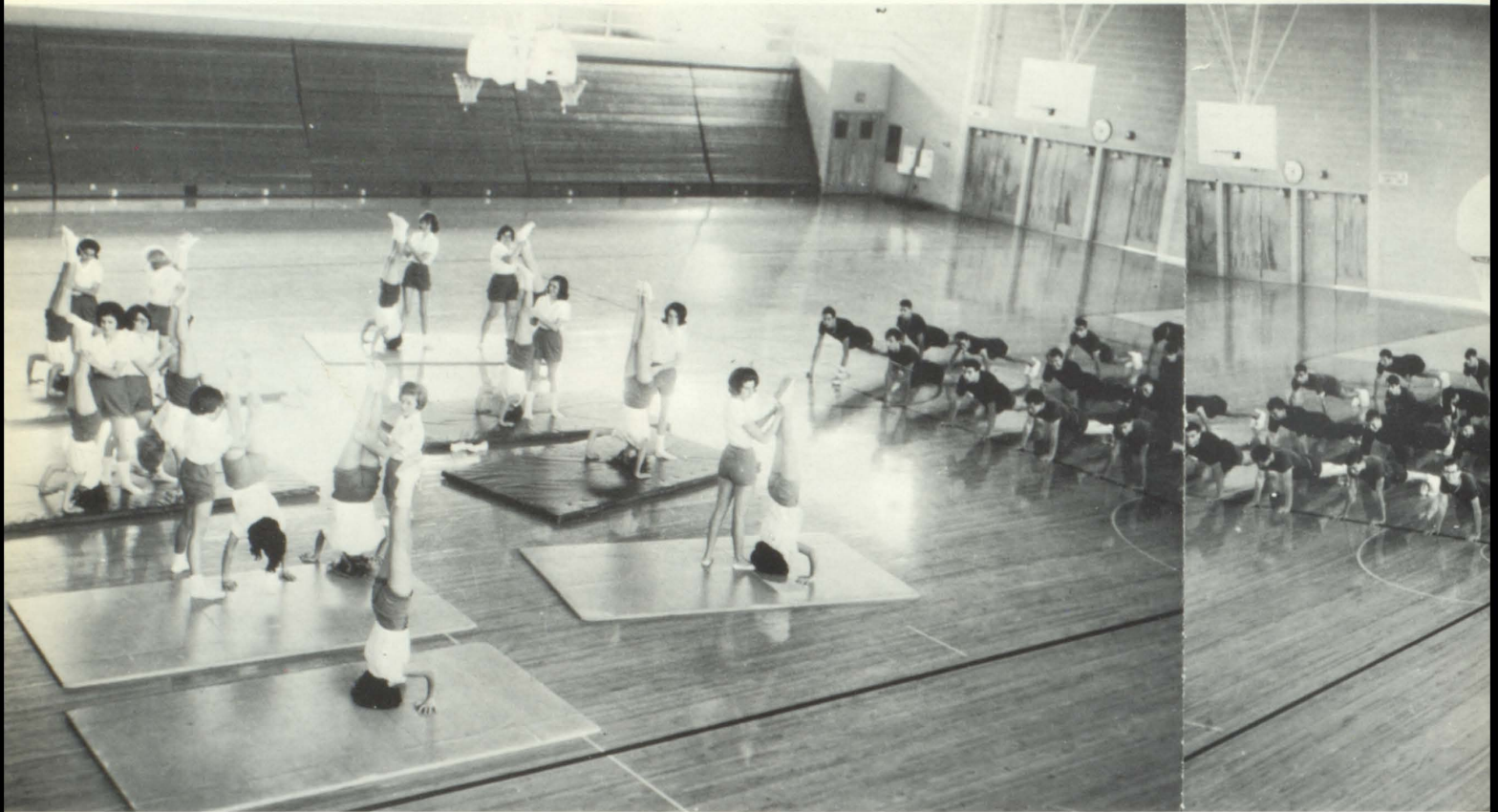

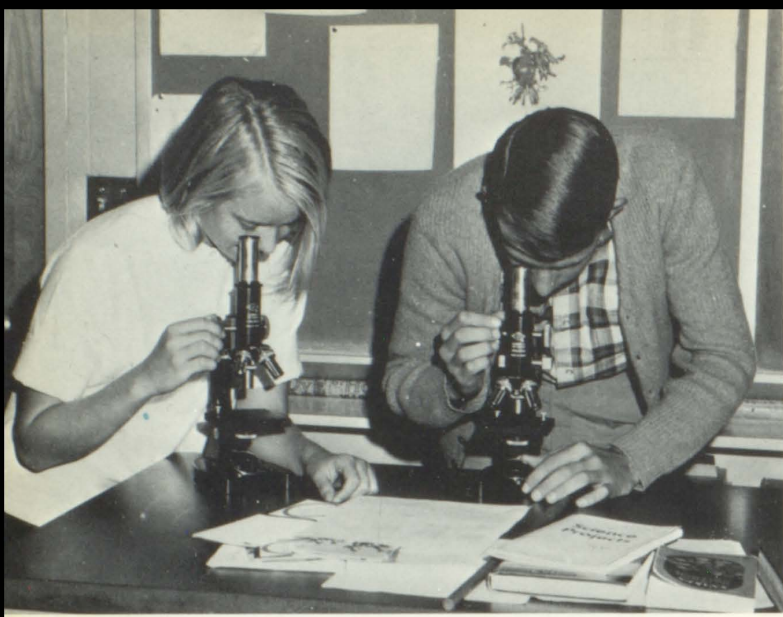

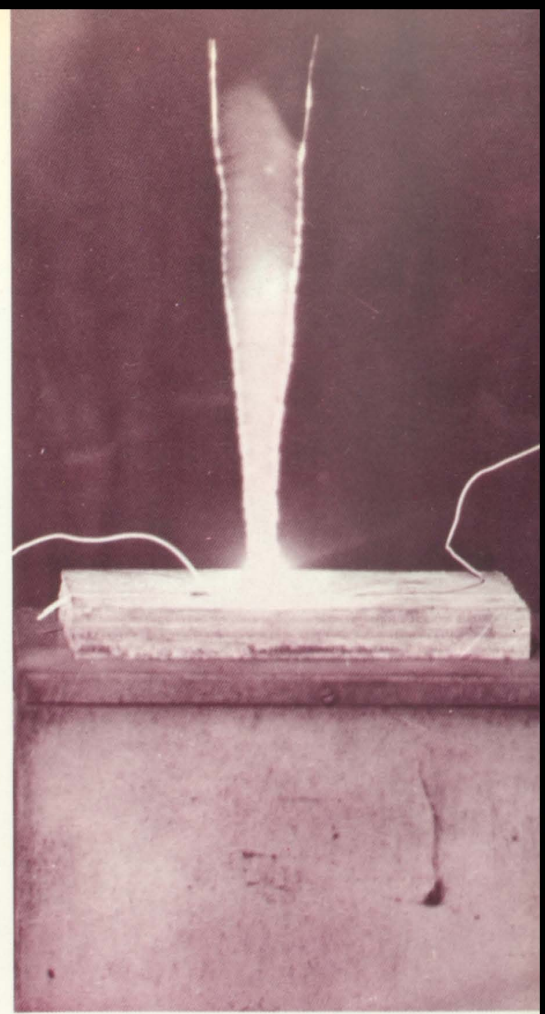

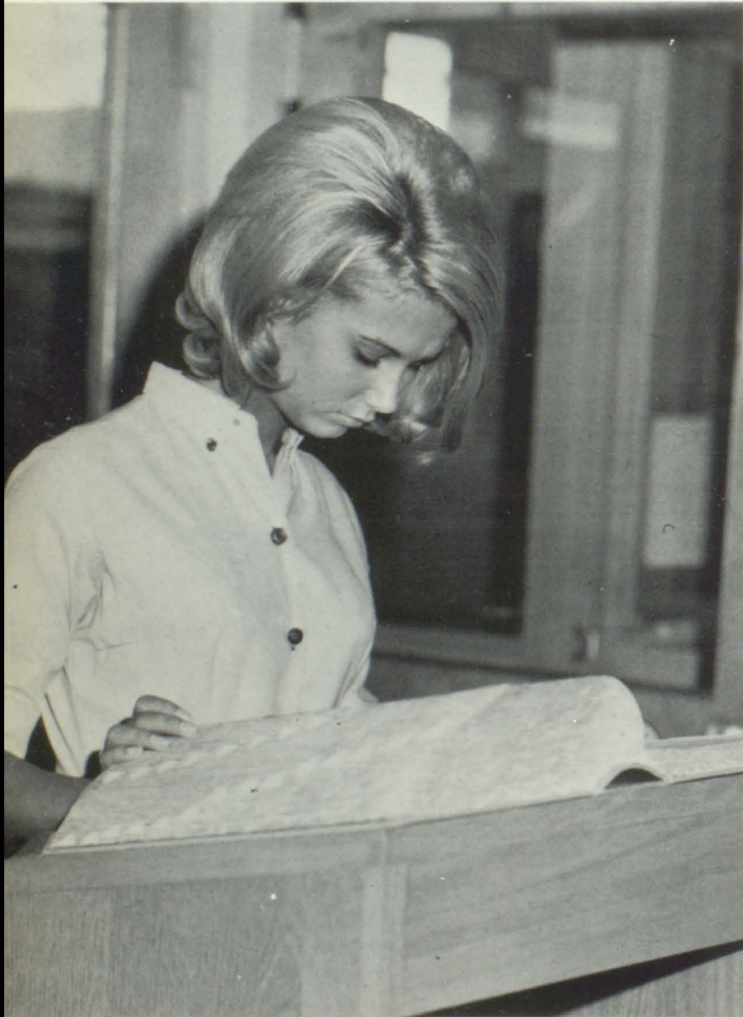

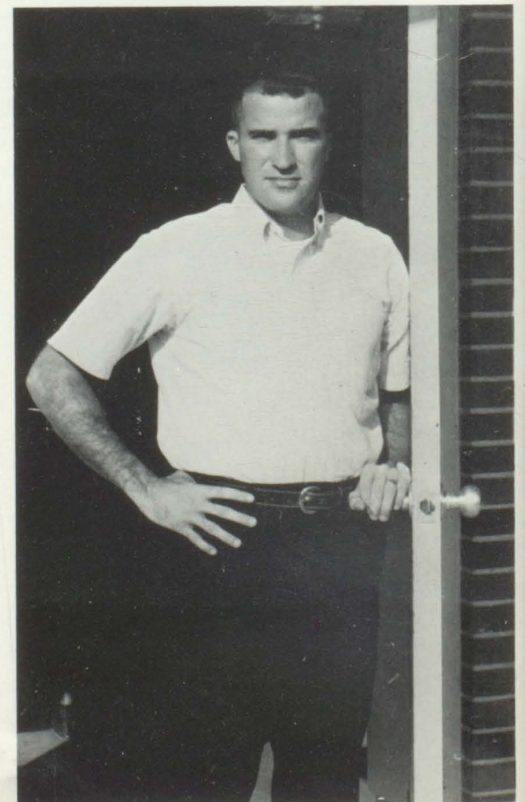

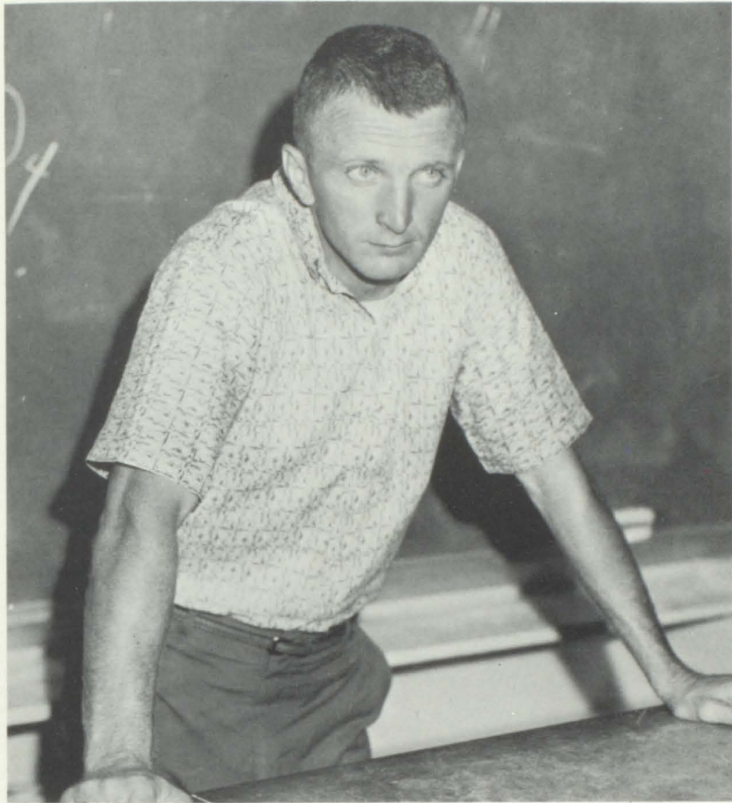

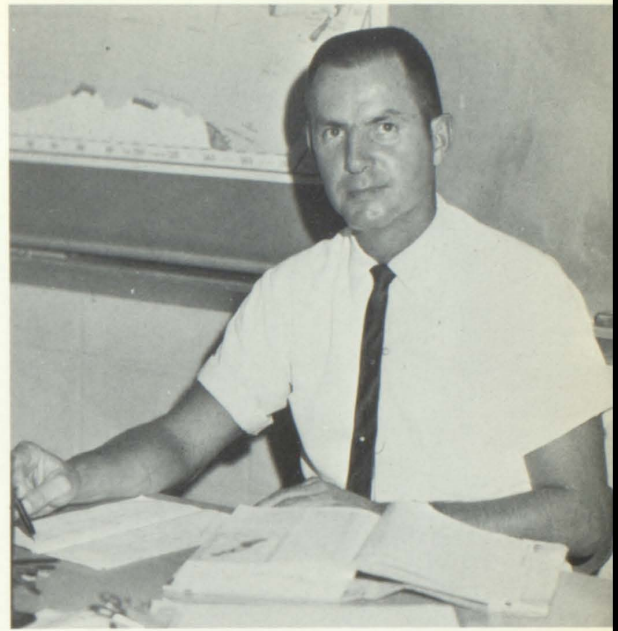

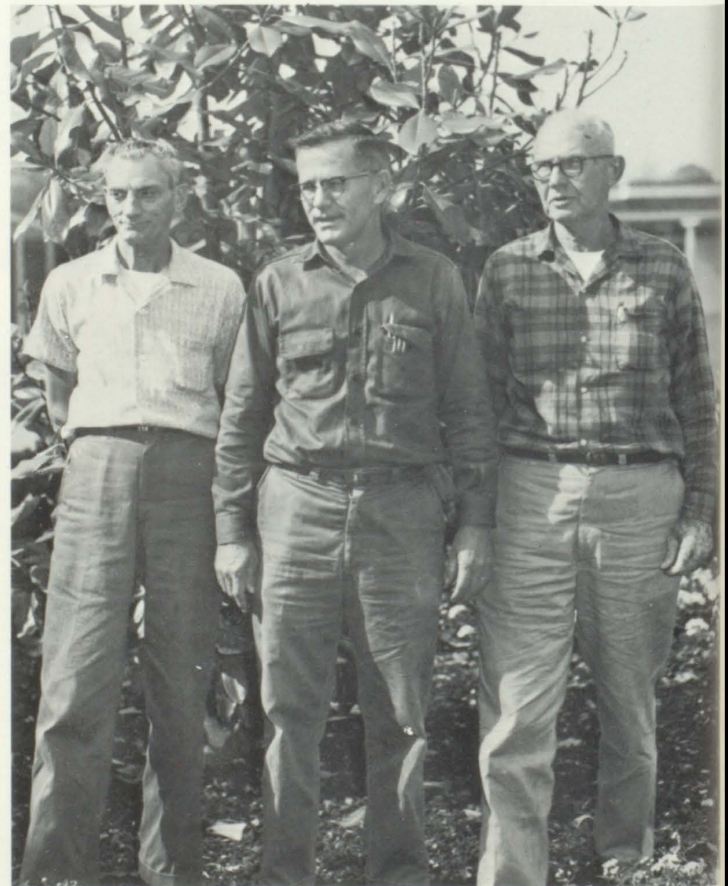

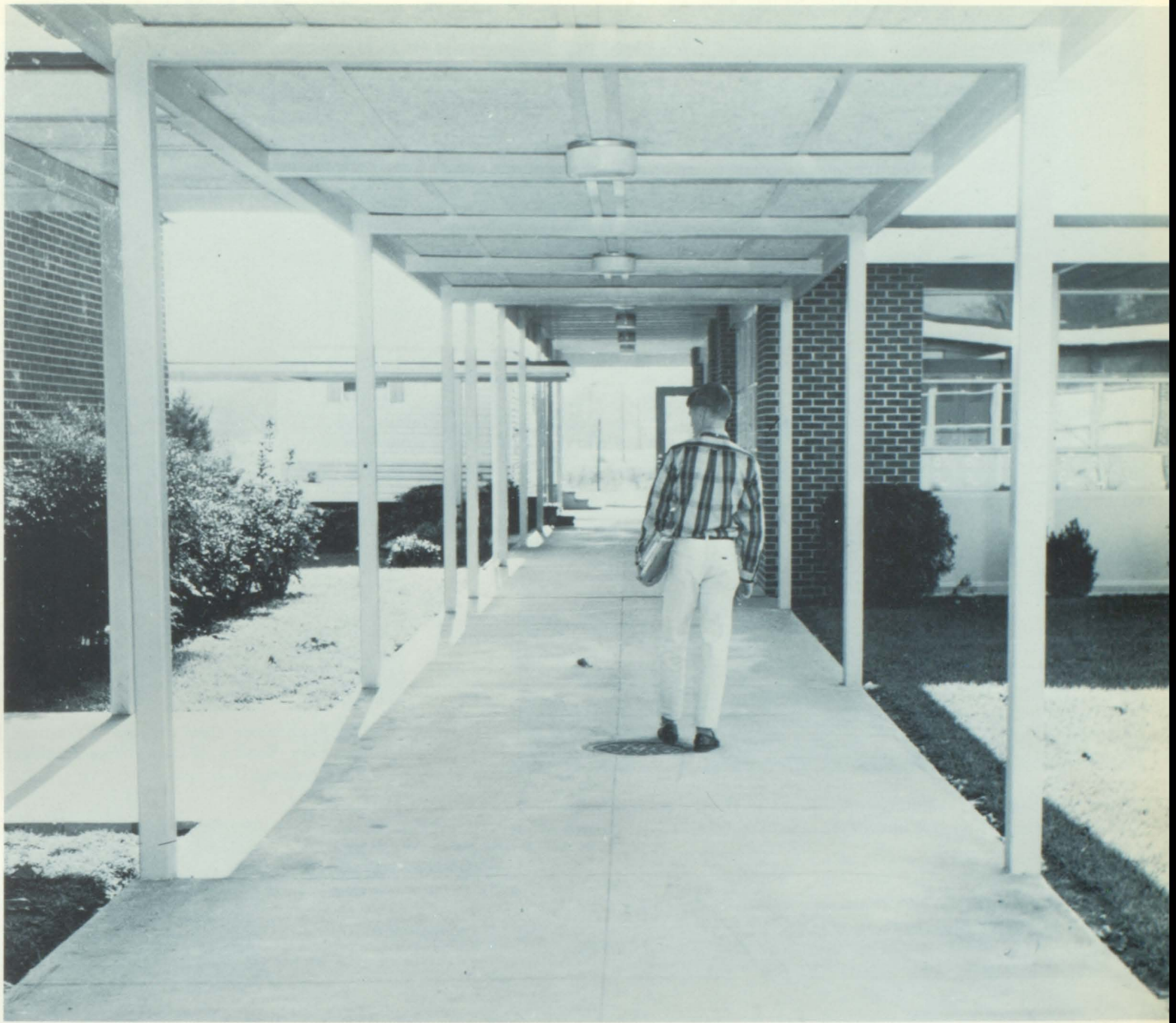

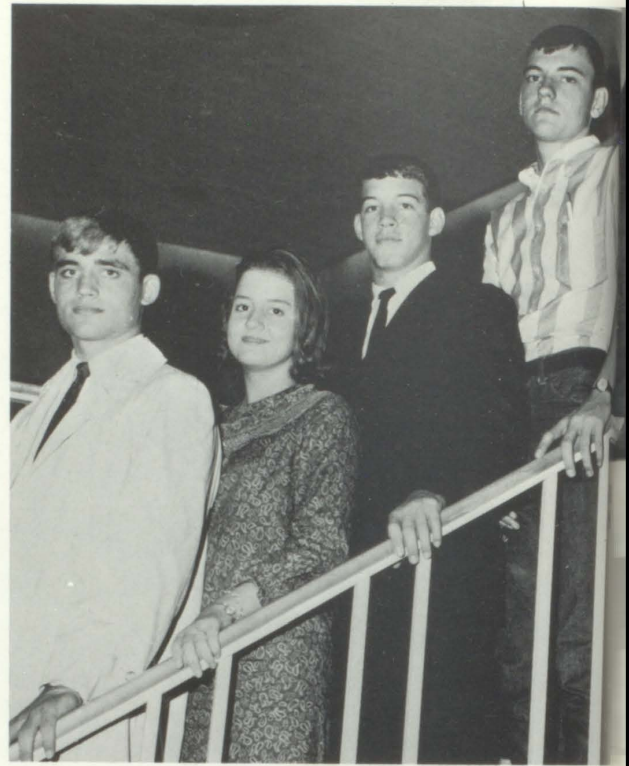

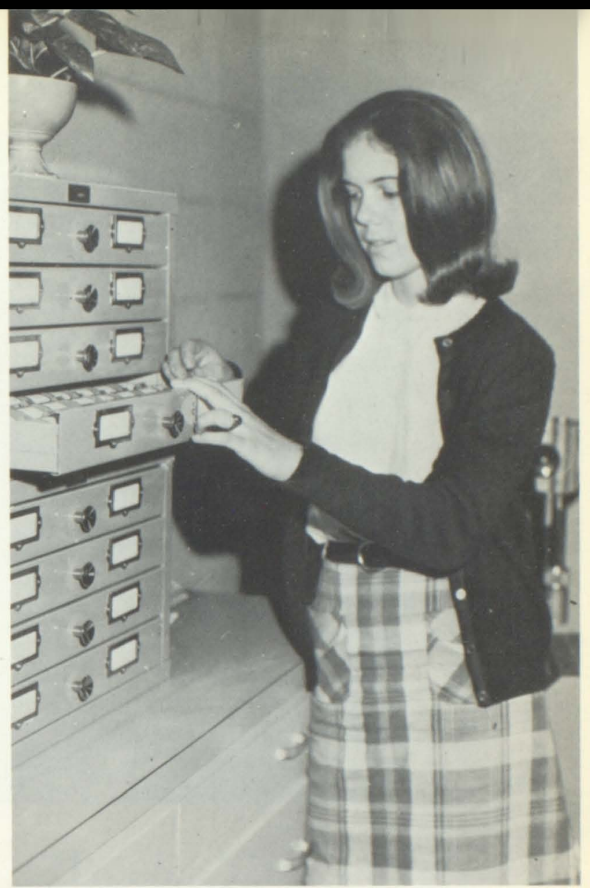

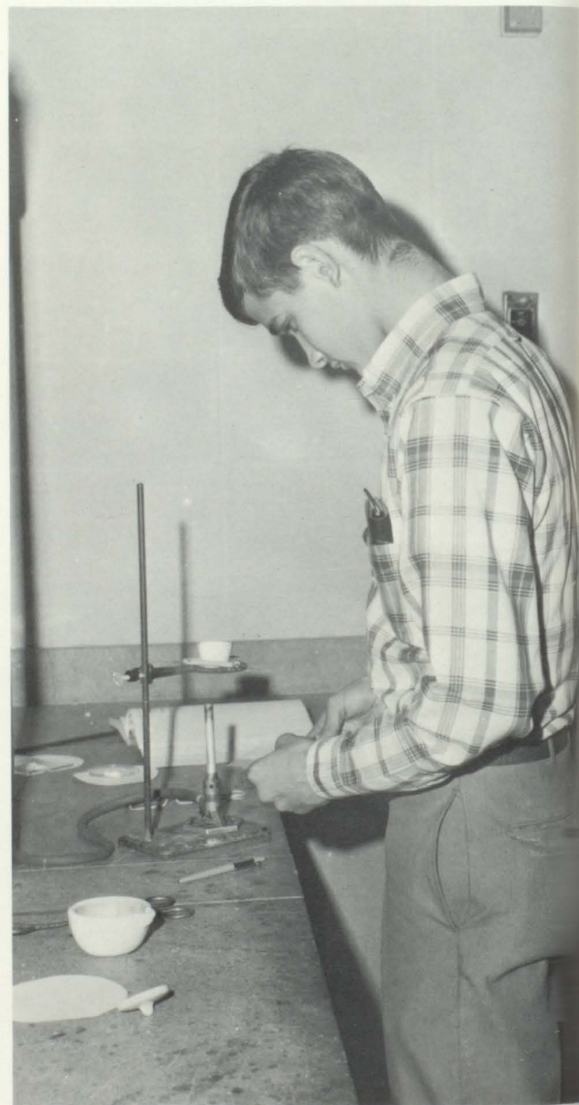

Science

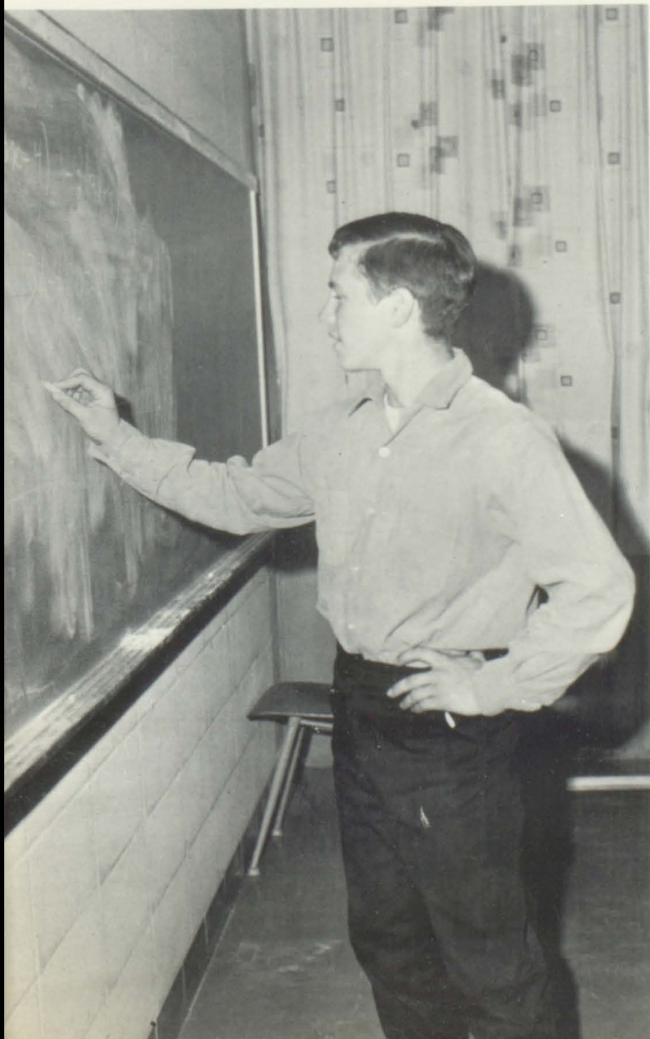

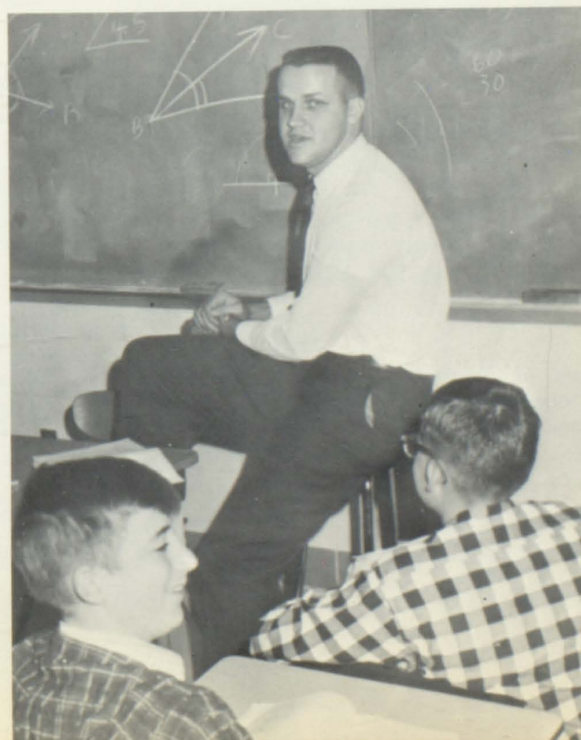


Mathematics

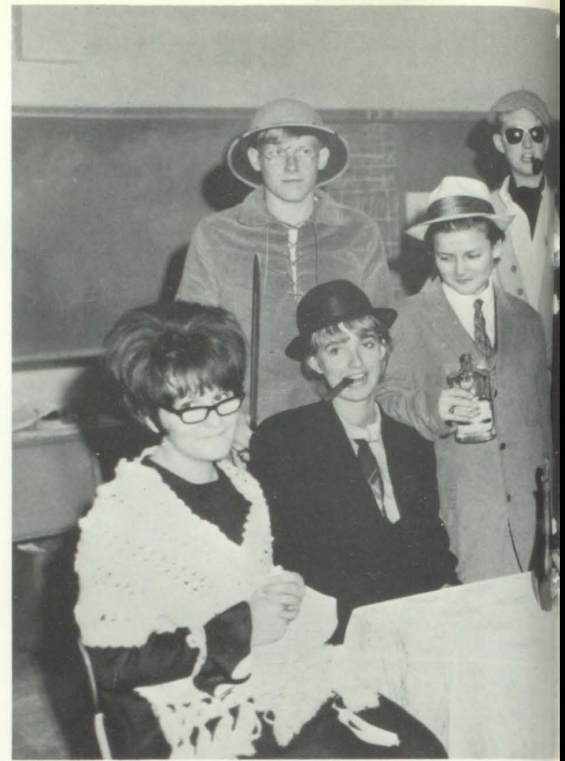
The interest shown in all these courses was a clear indication that students realized the importance of mathematics in the modern world.

In ACT examinations for college entrance, forty per cent of *CHS* seniors ranked in the top twenty-five per cent of all students taking the English test across the nation. Included with English are courses in various kinds of literature, speech and journalism. 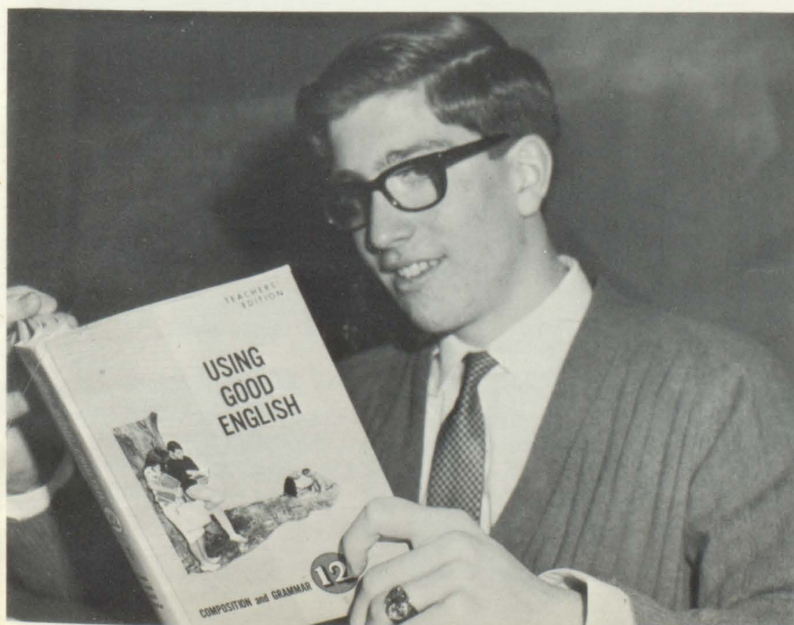

Languages are not only the basis of all communication, but they provide a knowledge of the culture and customs of the country or civilization which they represent.

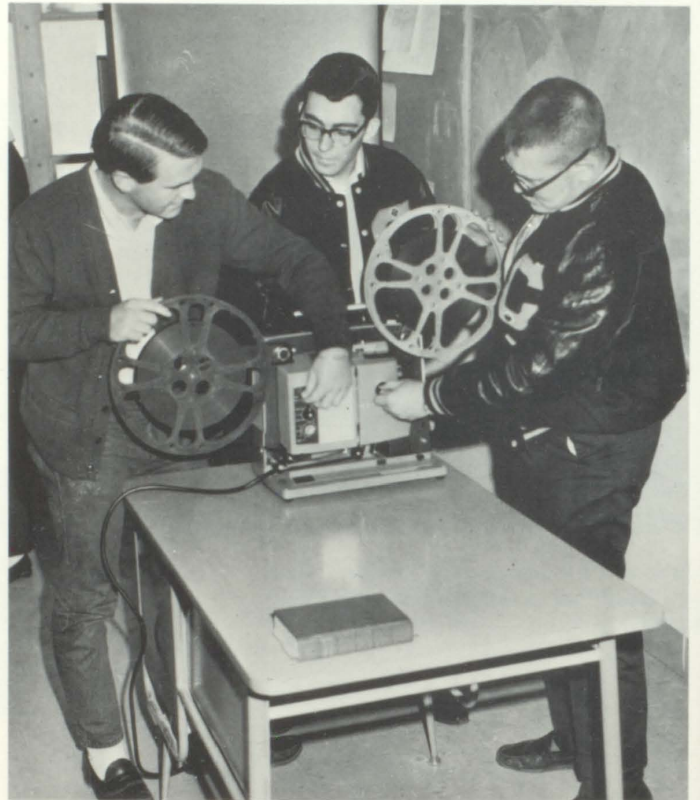
CHS offers four languages: two years of French, Spanish, and German and one year of Latin.

To begin this understanding, Freshmen explore the past of their state in Alabama History. They learn basic concepts of government and ancient civilizations in World History and World Geography.

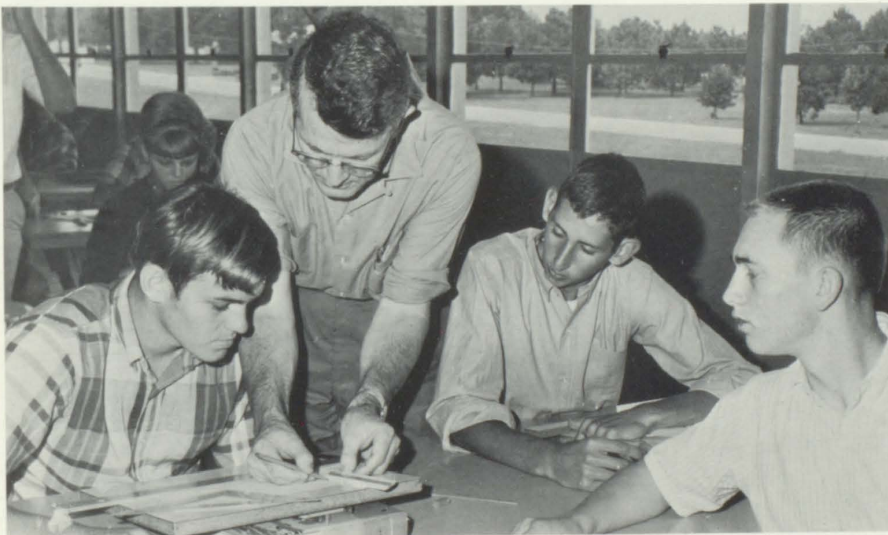

Vocational

Vocational courses are offered to students who plan to begin their careers upon graduation. Industrial Co-operative Training gives an opportunity to take courses that enable students to work part-time and go to school part-time. They receive on-the-job training and a salary, while they complete their education.

Home Economics I and Advanced Home Economics students study all aspects of keeping the home, health, and child.

Developing leadership in farming, agriculture students study a variety of farm related subjects: conservation, forestry, livestock, field crops, and horticulture. A major segment of the program is shop where students are trained in welding, woodworking, and the use of small gasoline engines.

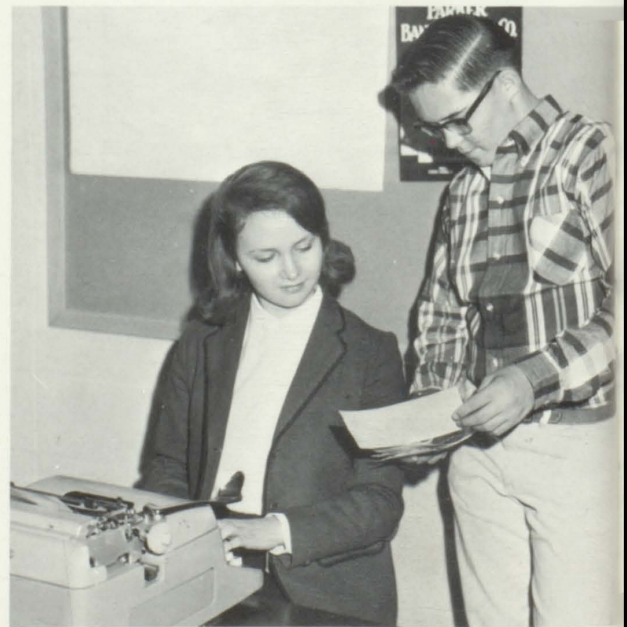

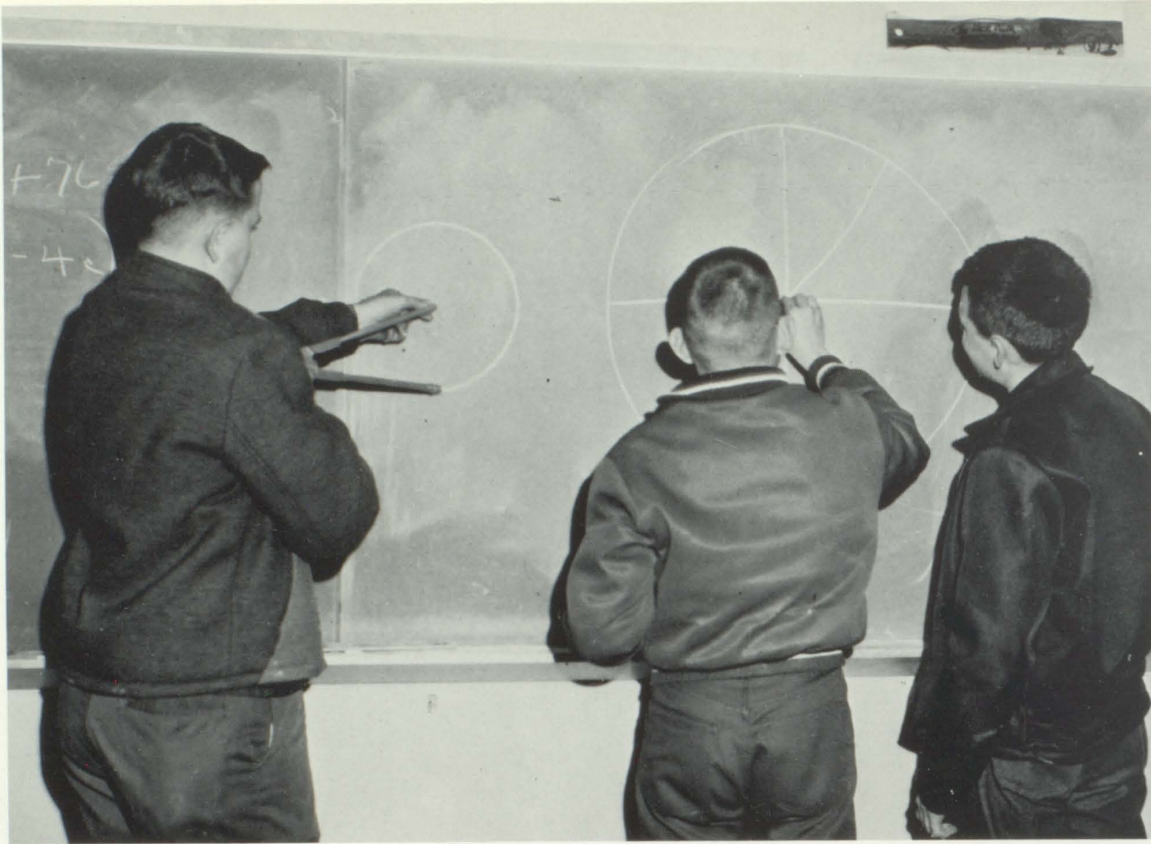

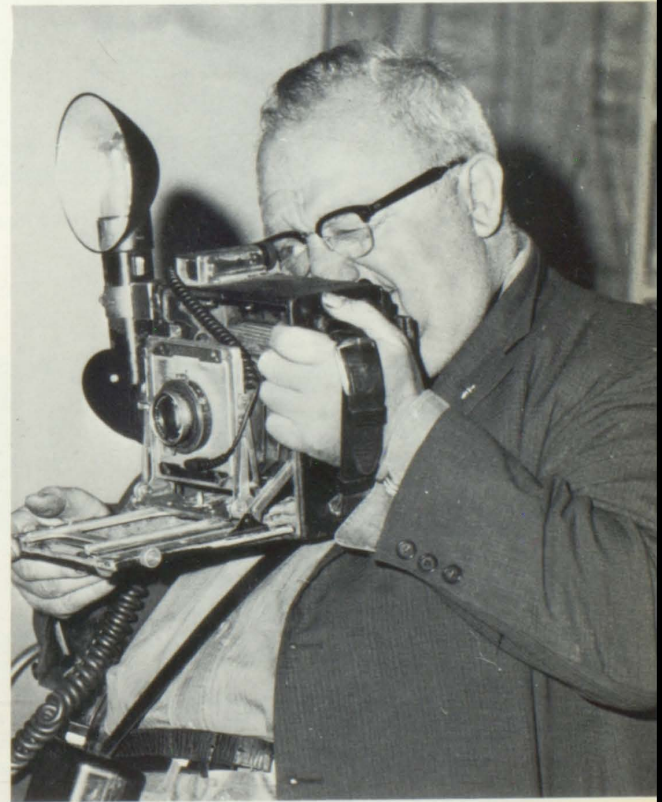

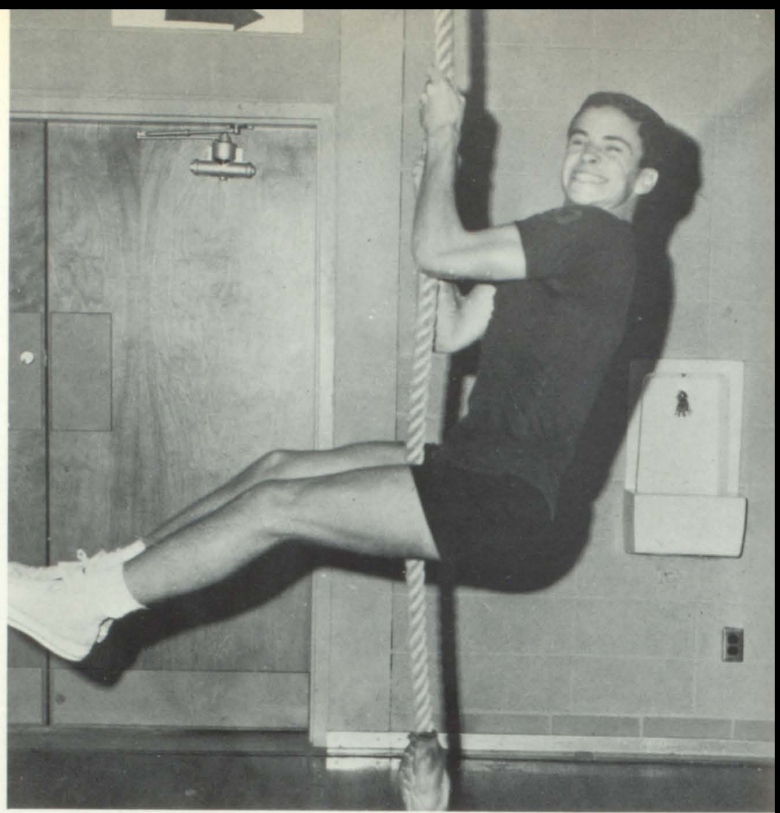

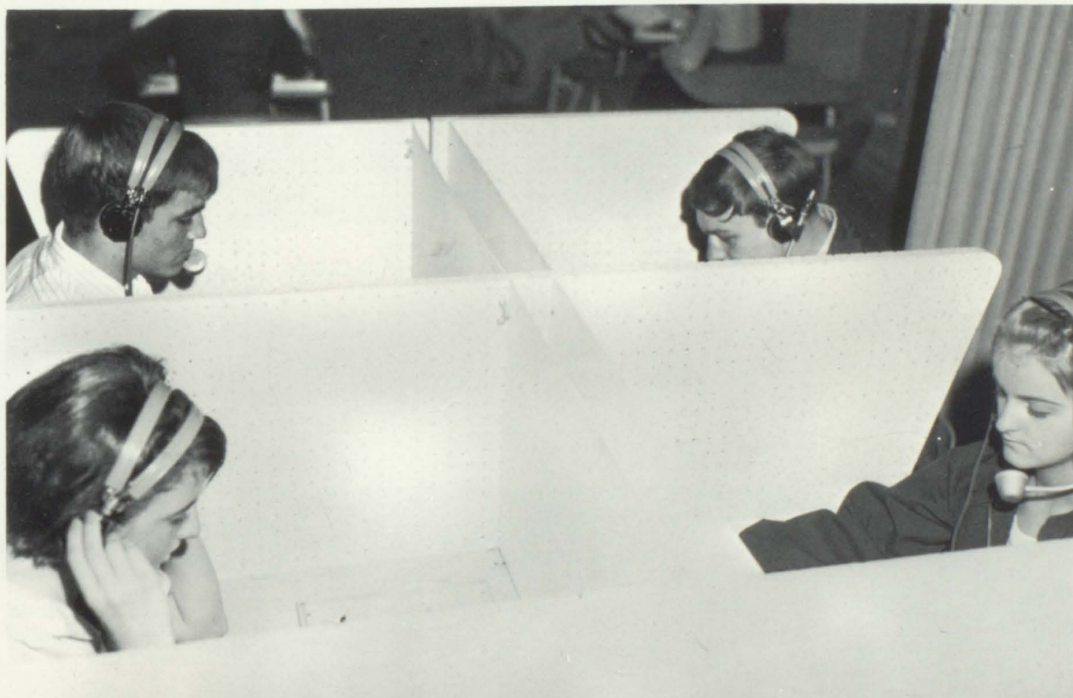

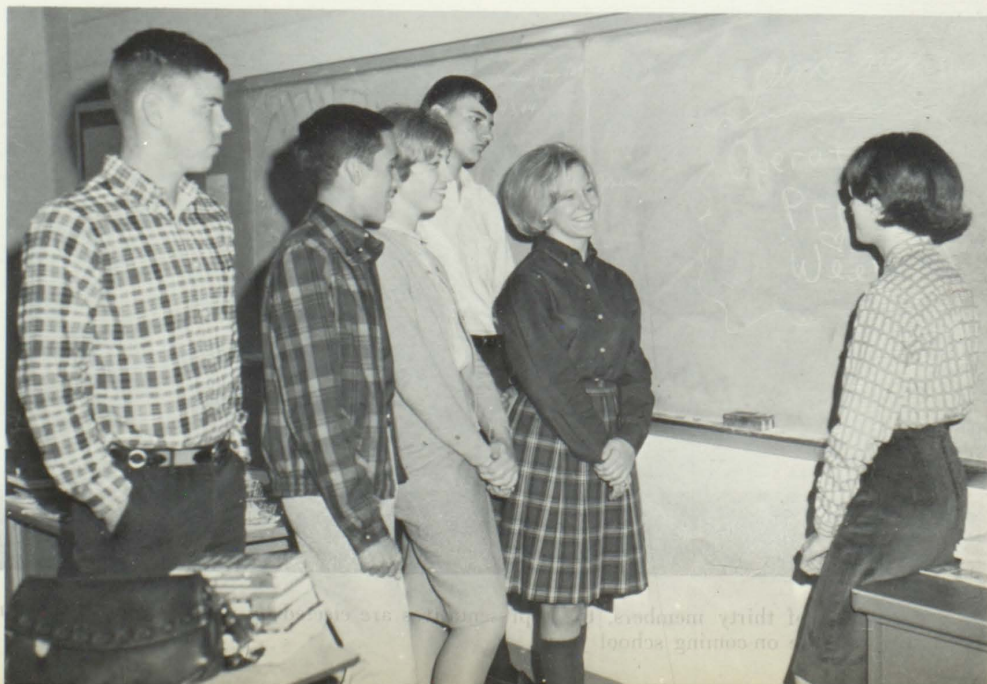

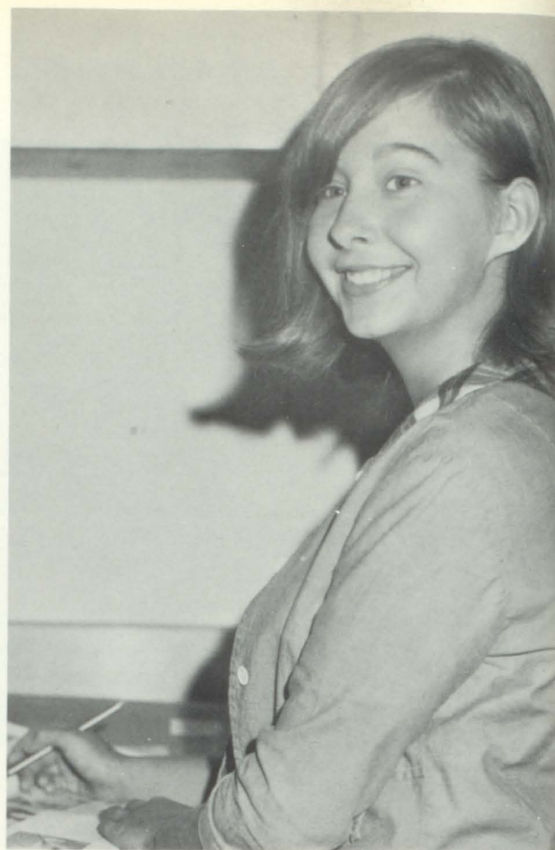

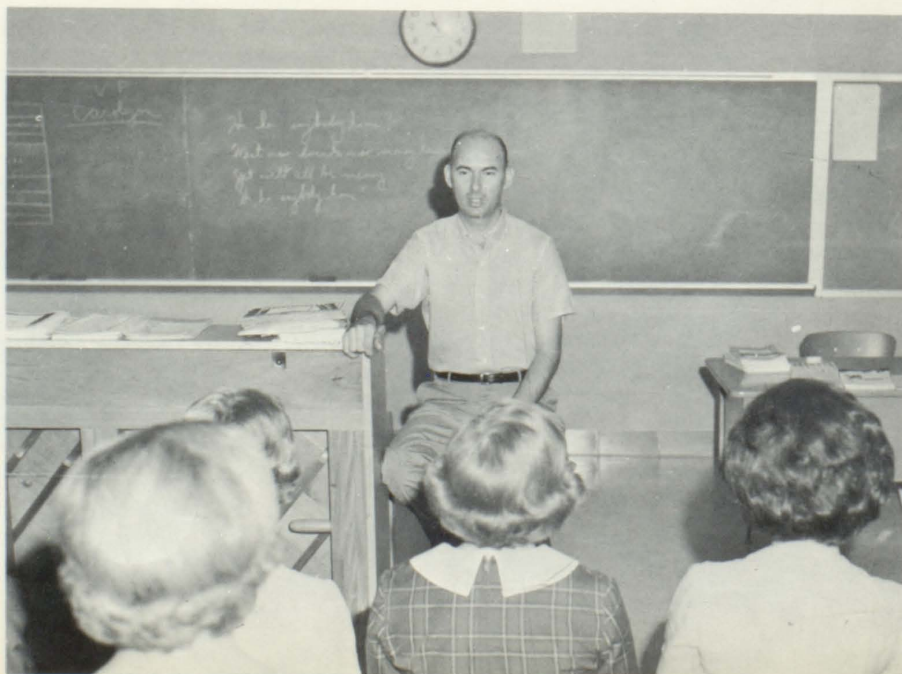

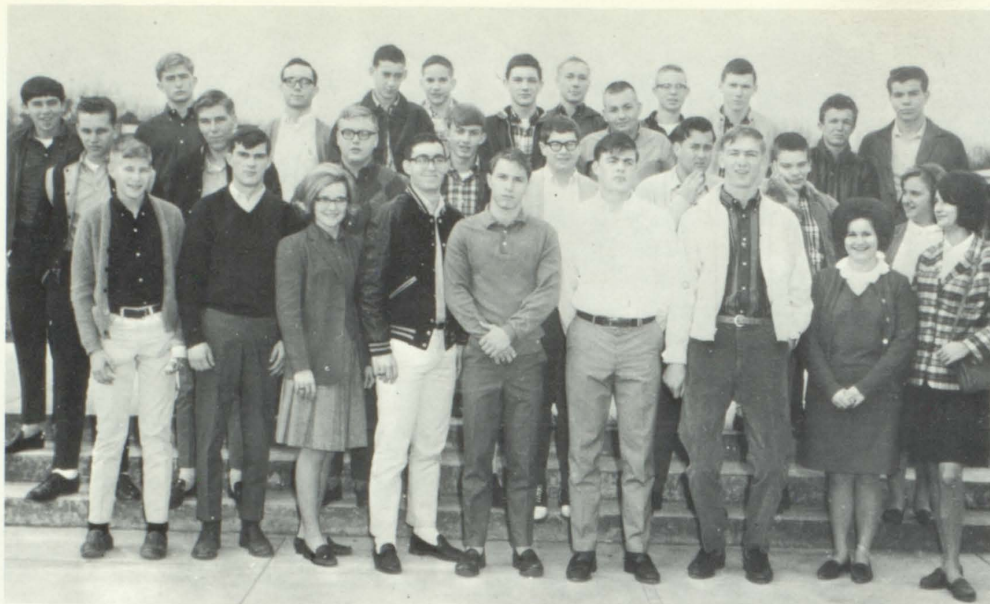

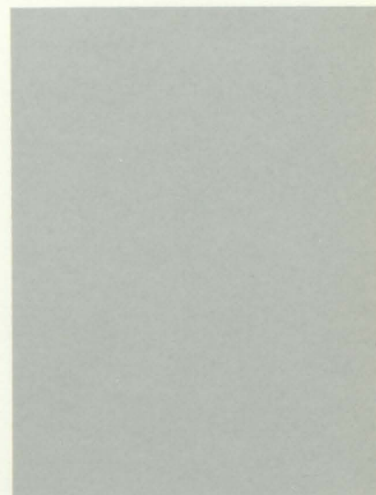

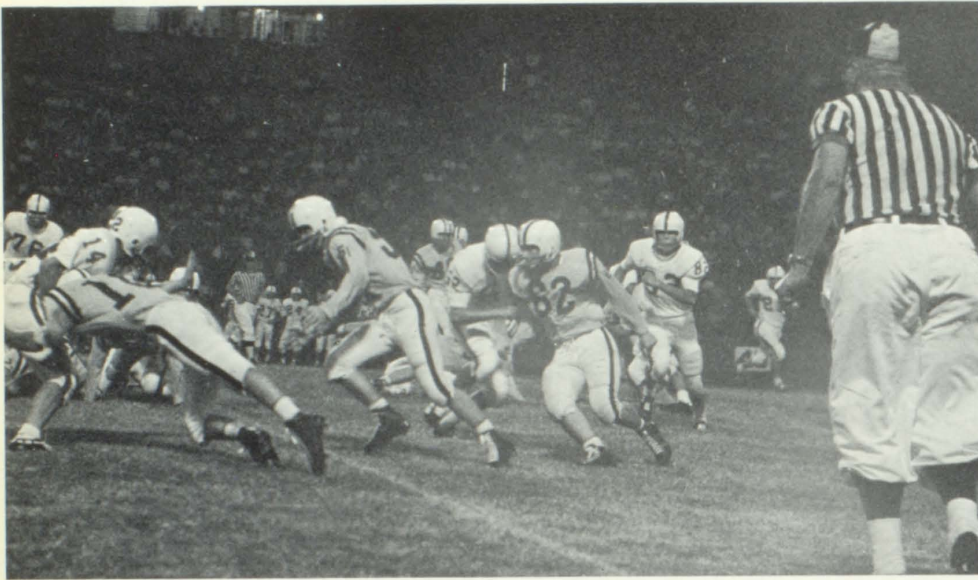

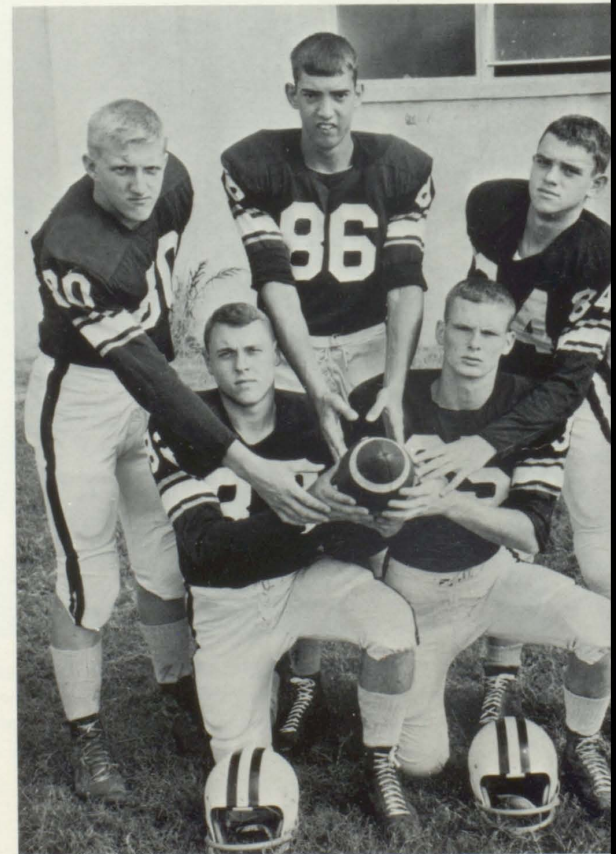

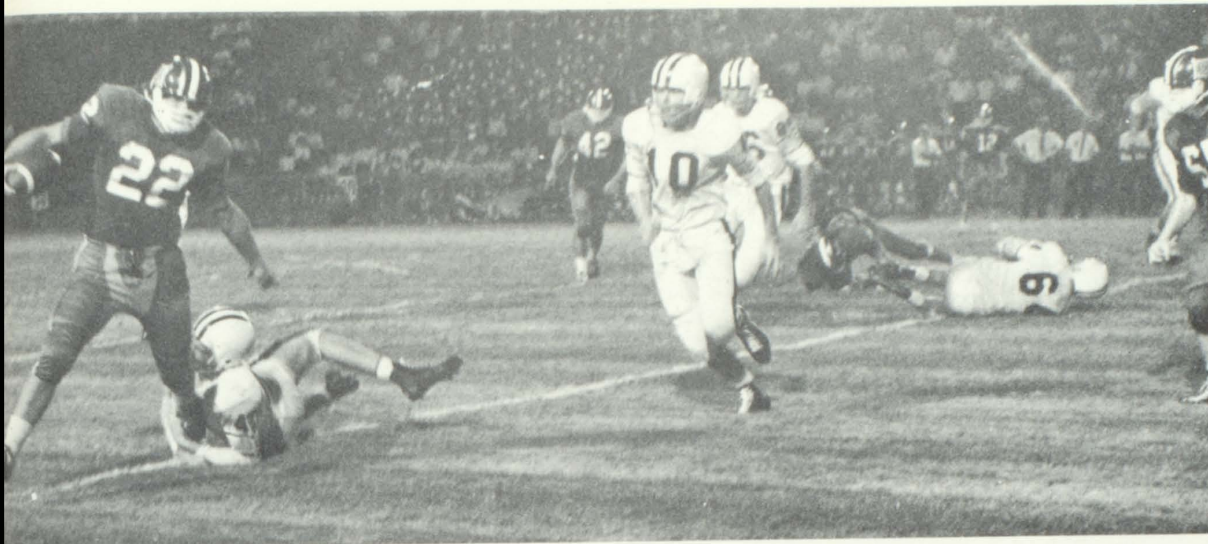


GUARDS—Kneeling: Jack Stevens, Eddy Harris. Standing: Ricky Gober, Steve Singleton, and James Laminack.

Bearcats Eat Butler, 46-13



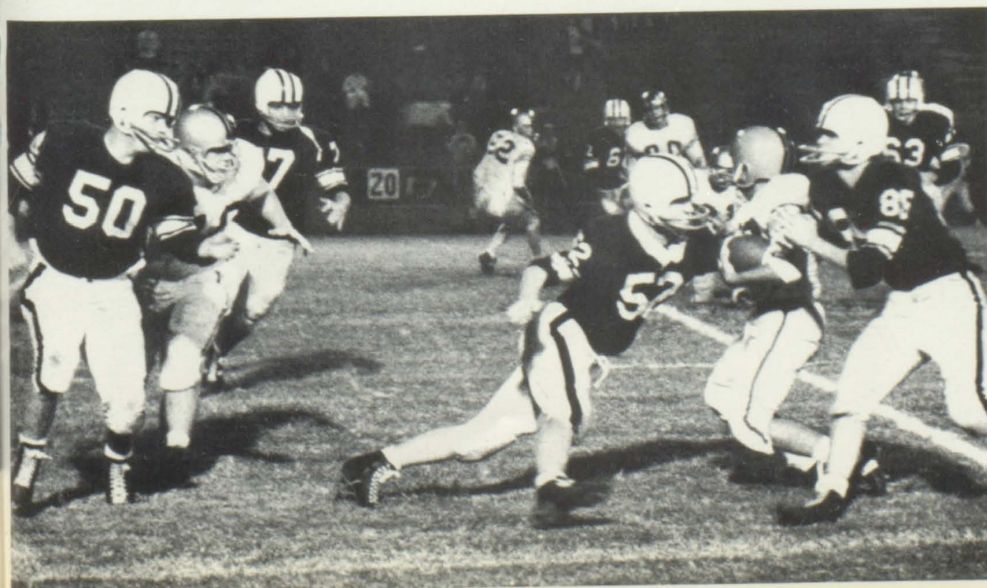

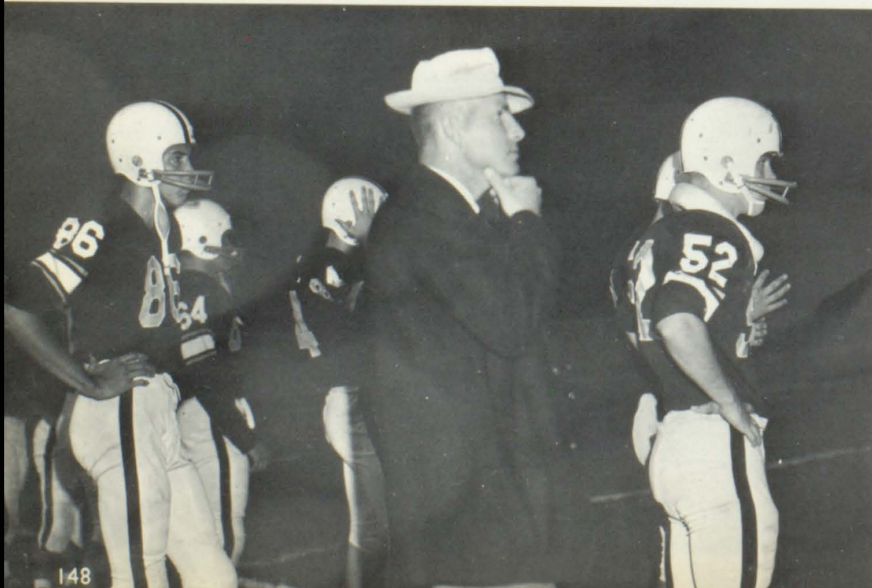

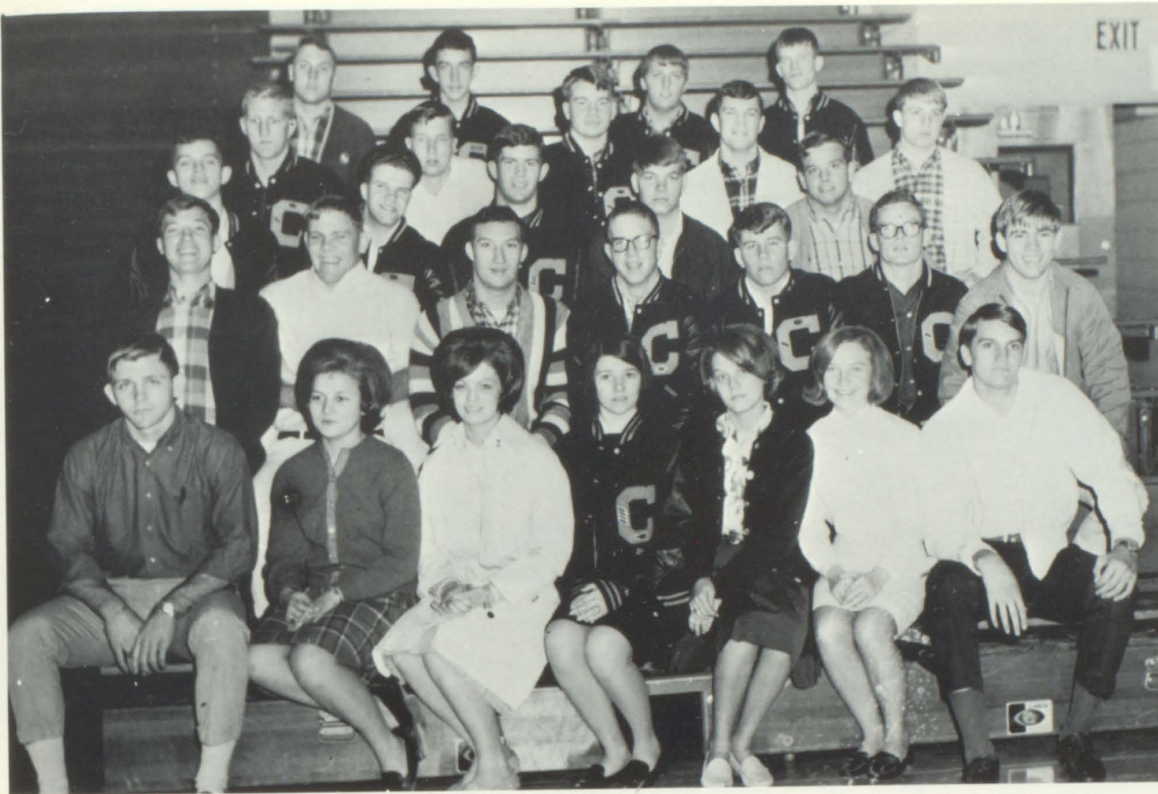

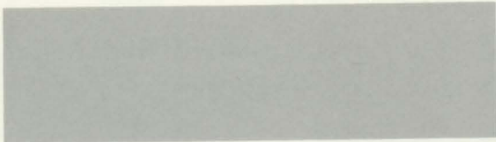

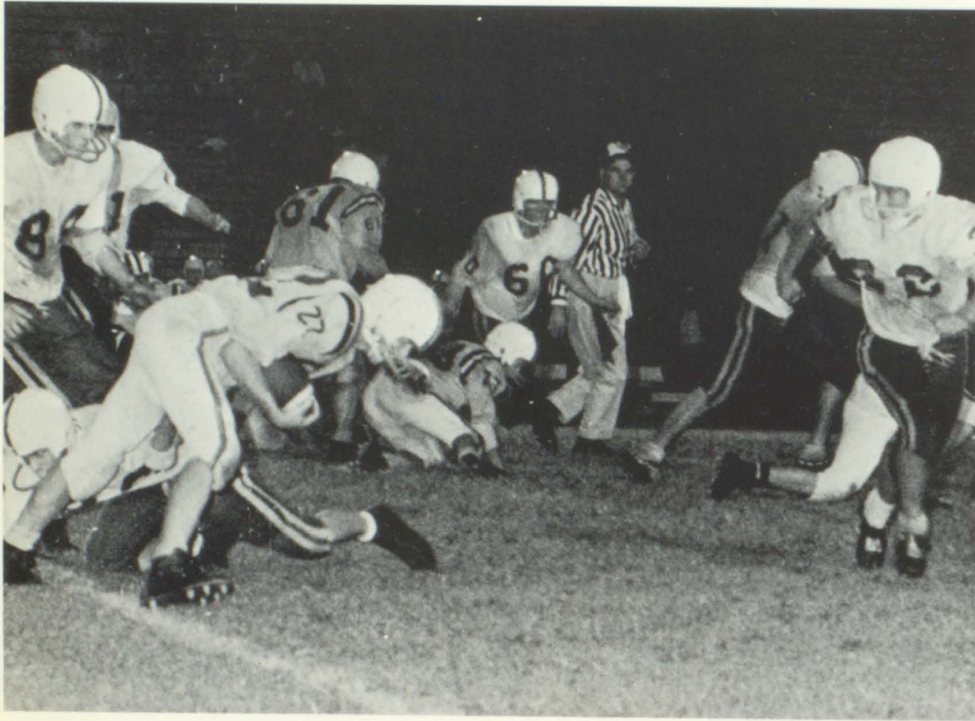

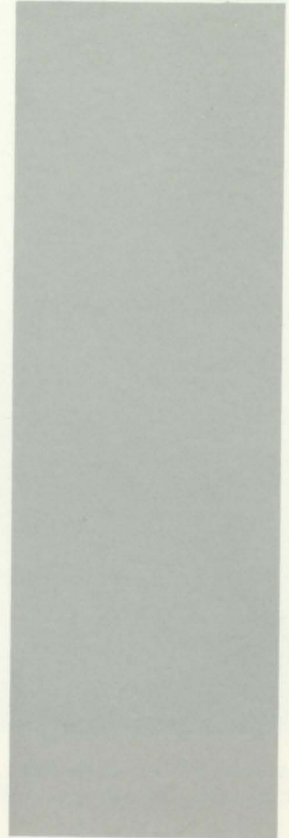

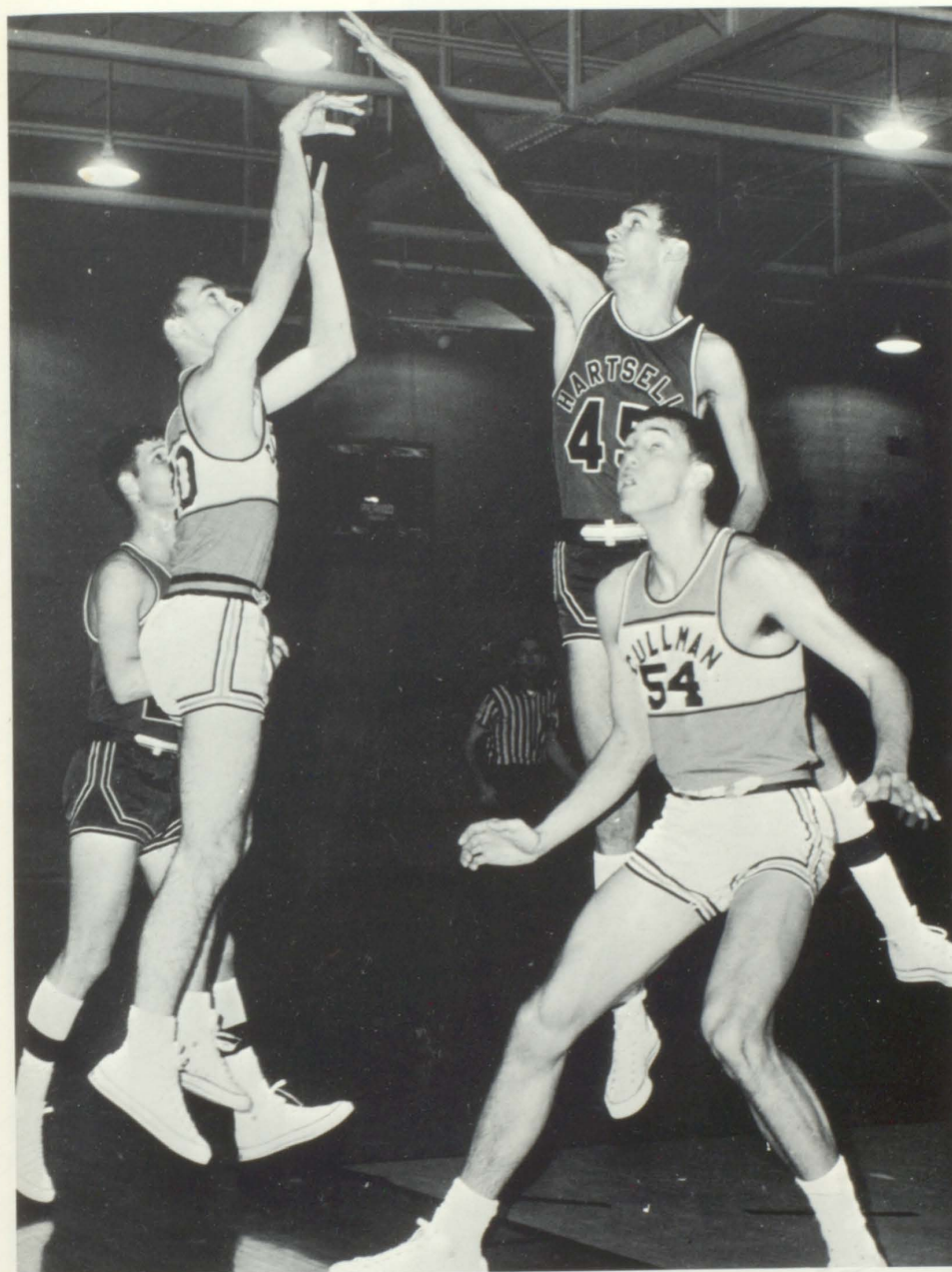

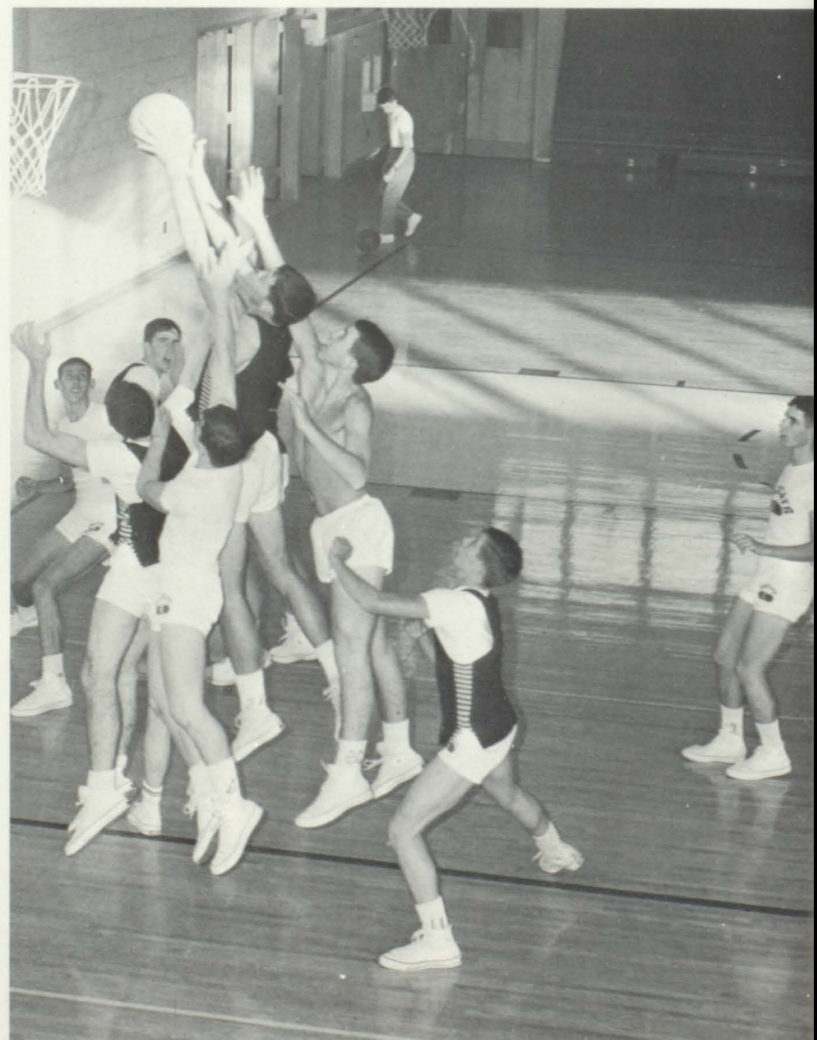

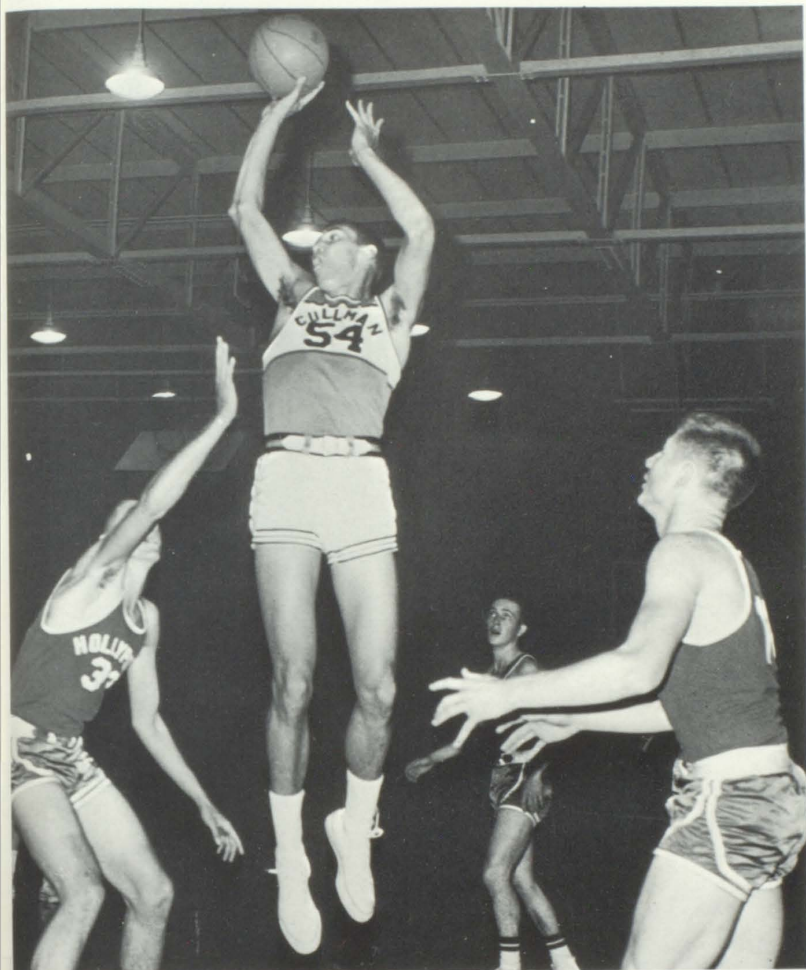

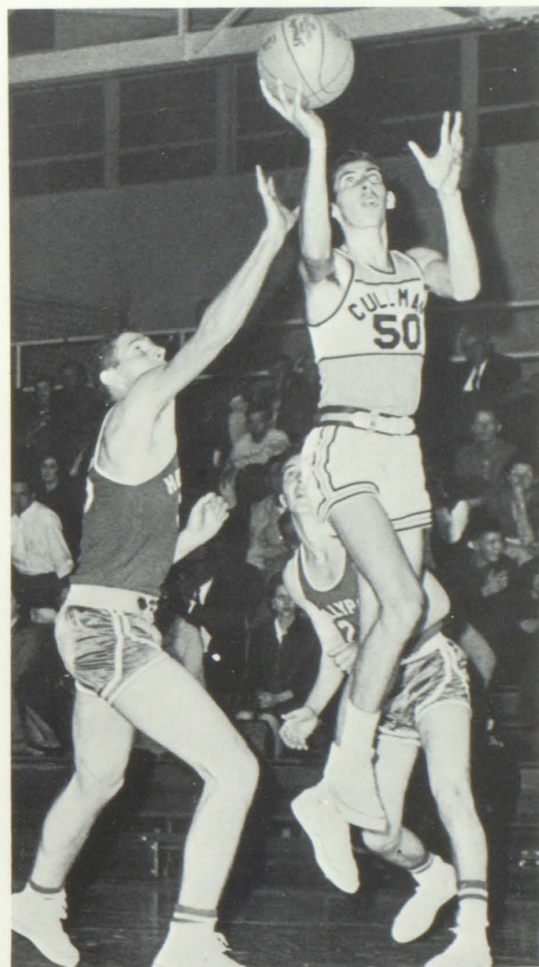

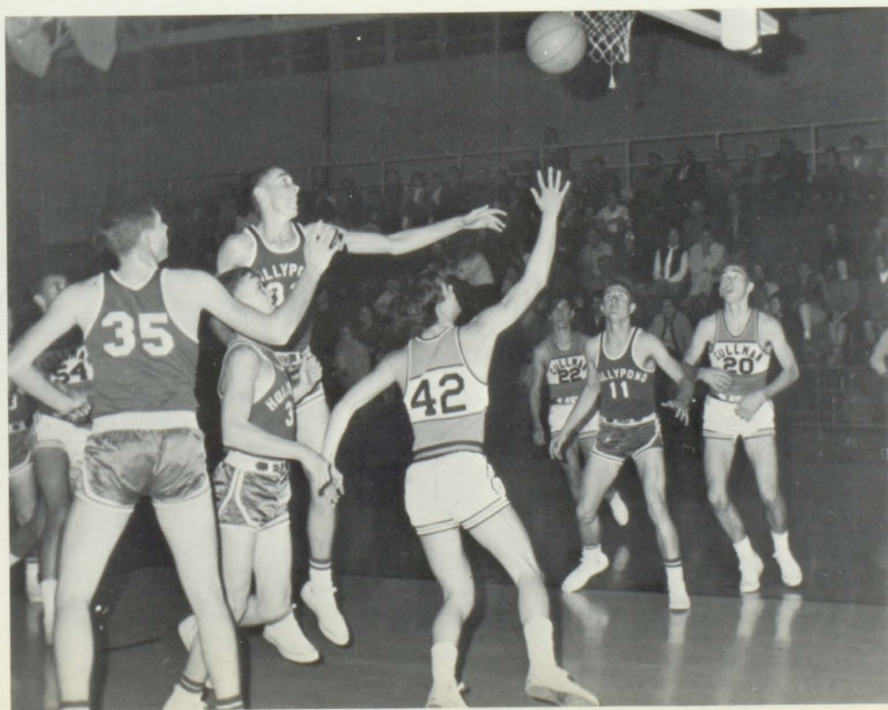

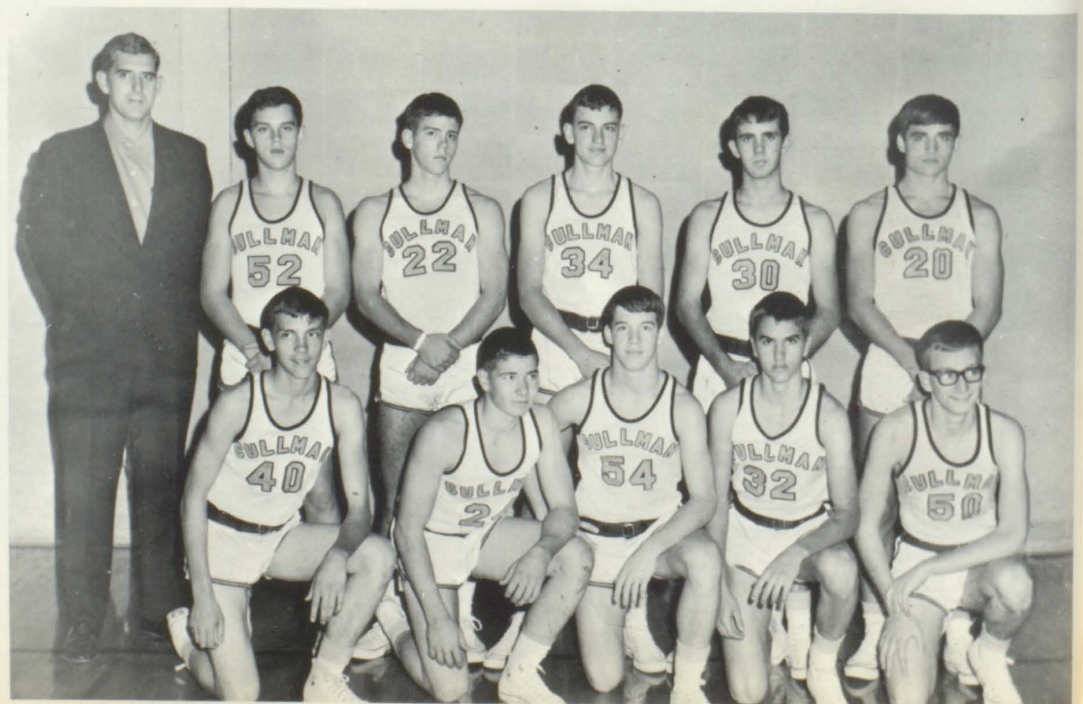

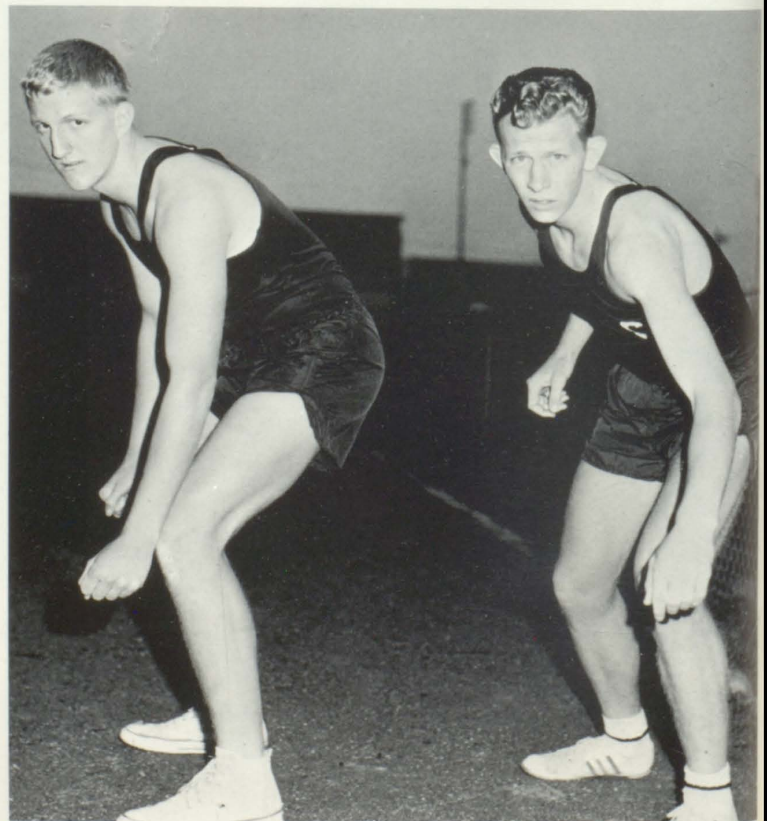

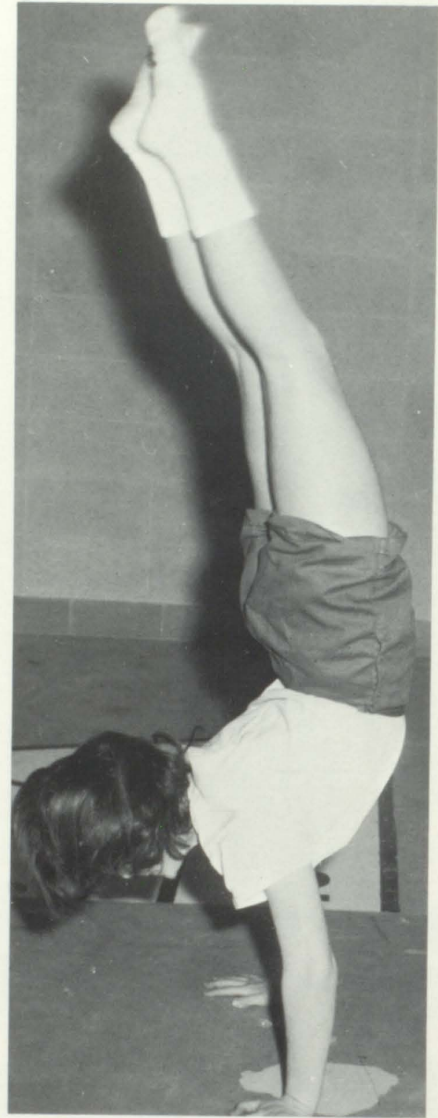

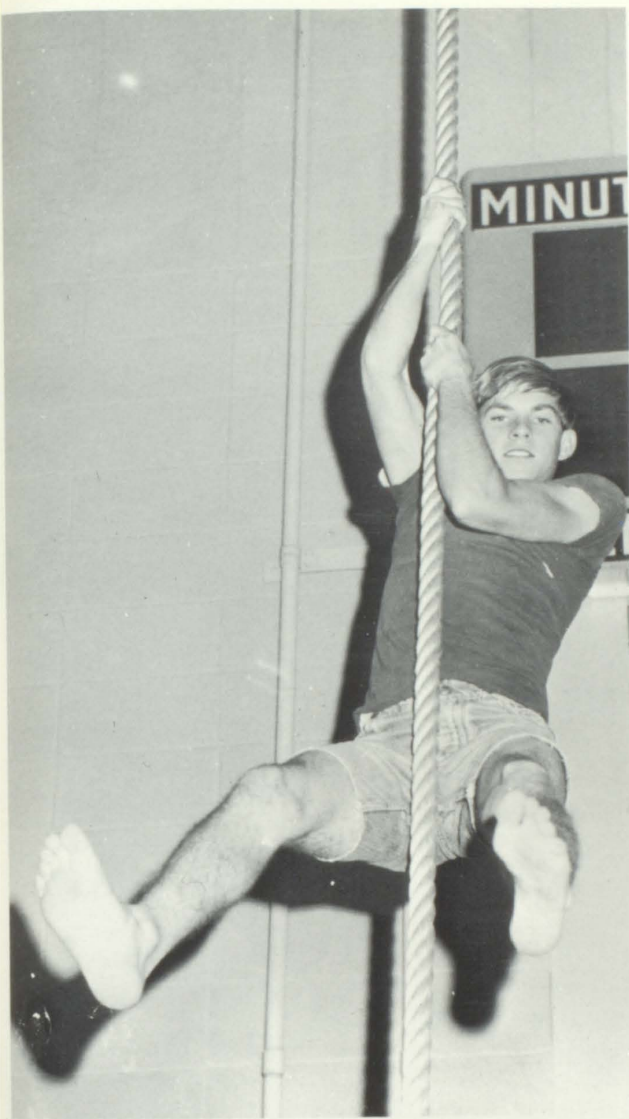

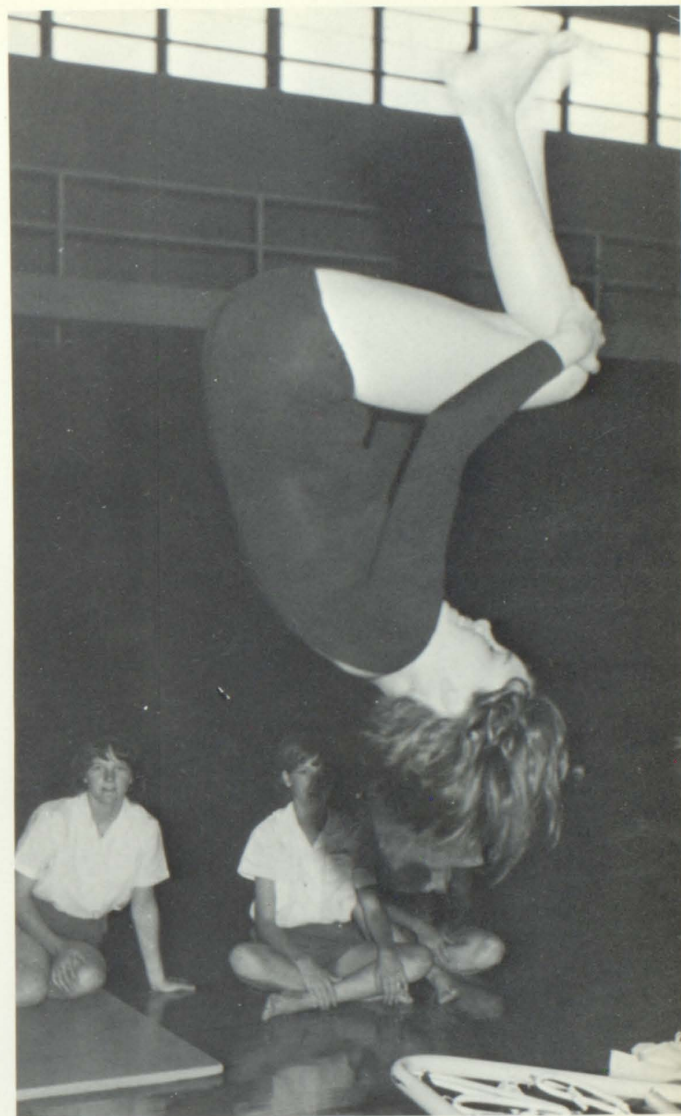

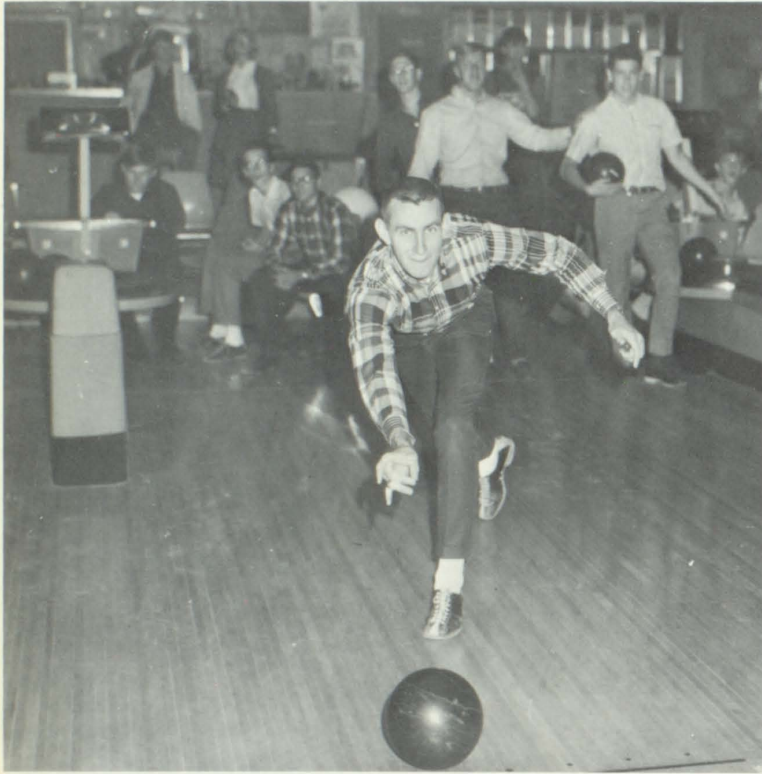


Brenda Burnam of second period, demonstrates the difficult front somersault off the mini-tramp.

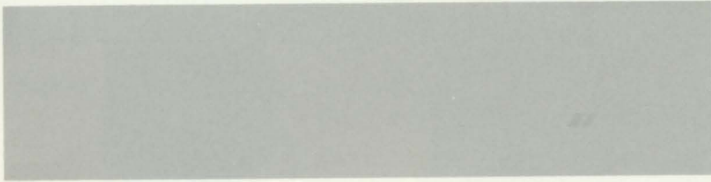

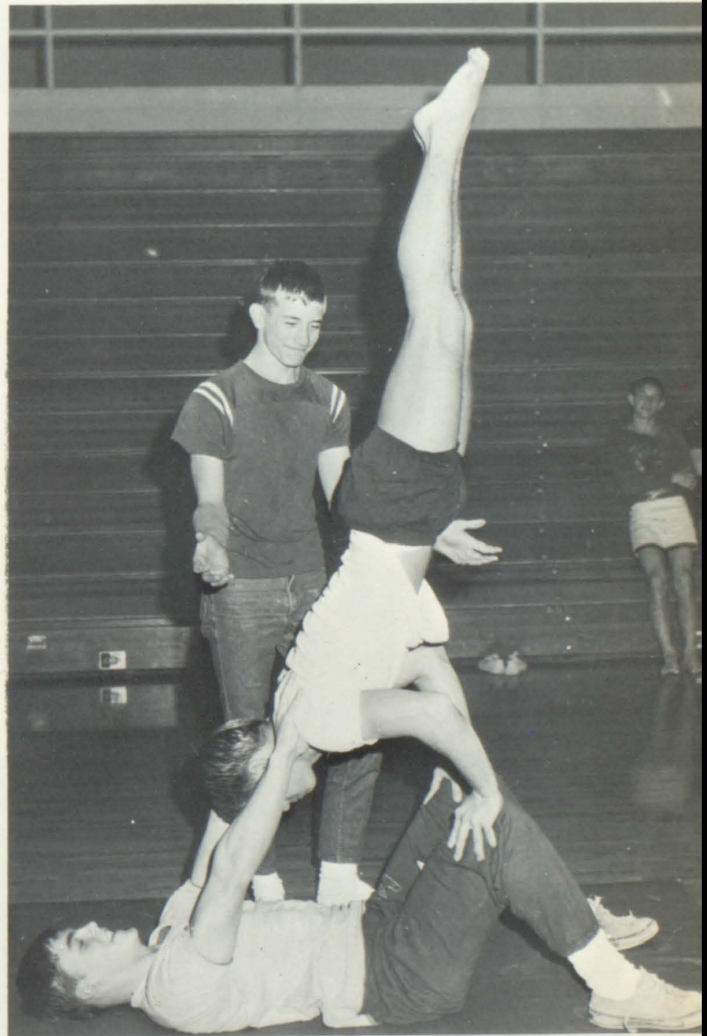

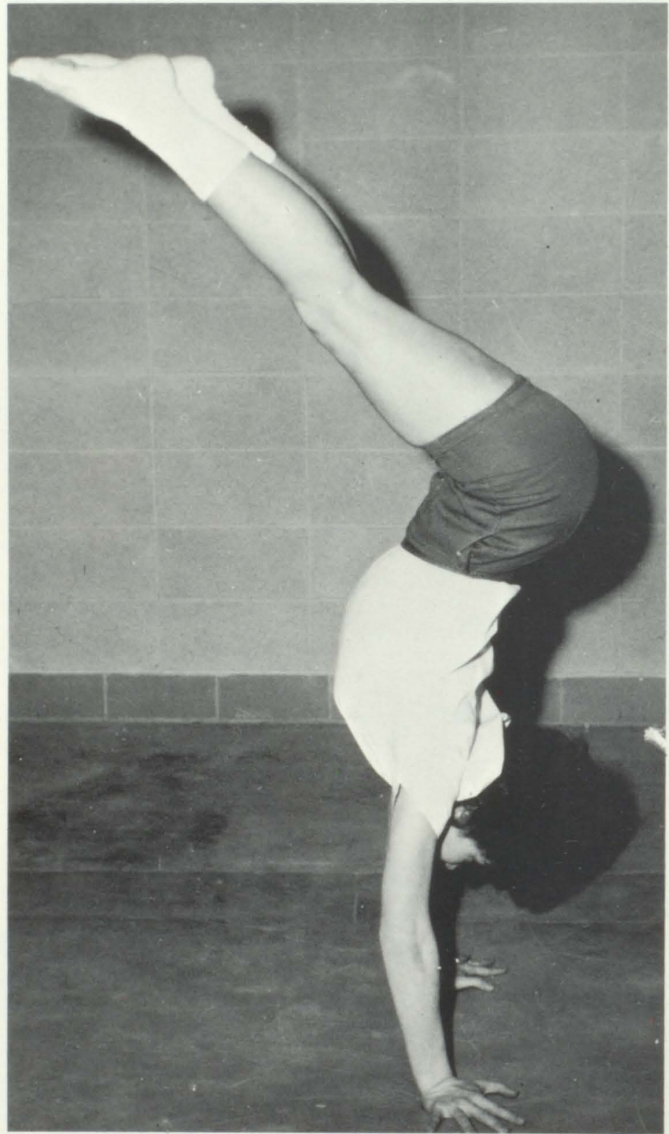

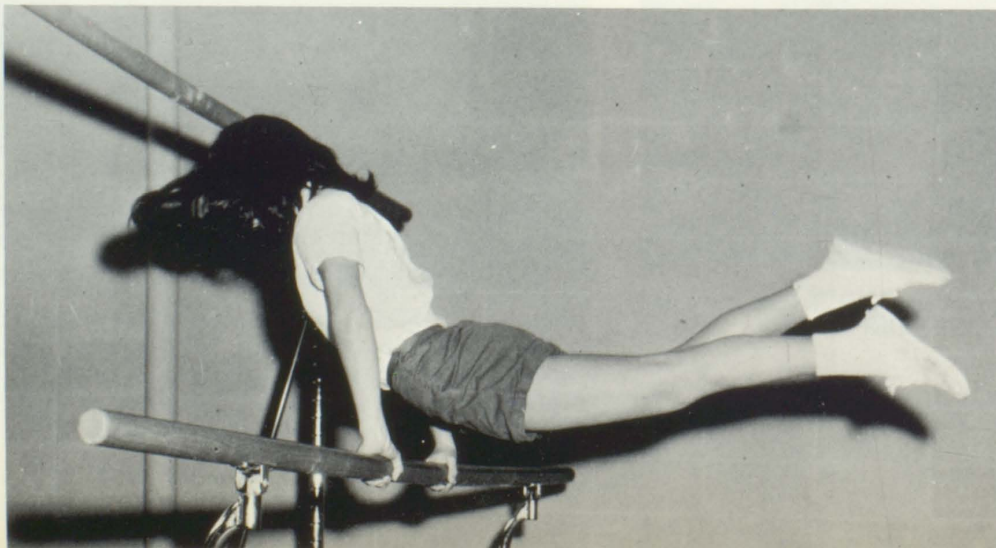

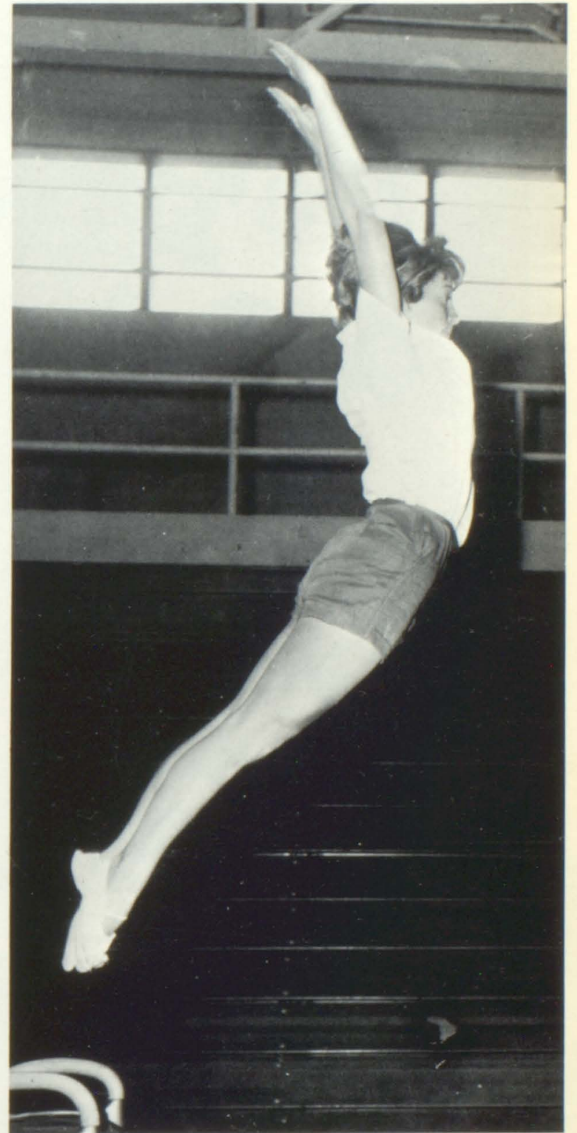

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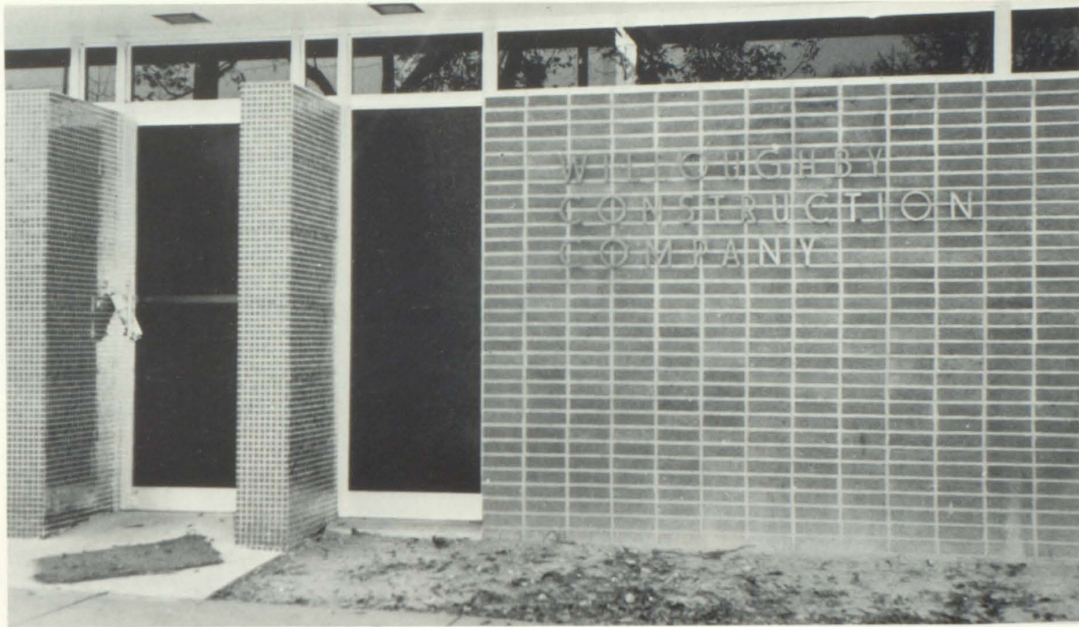

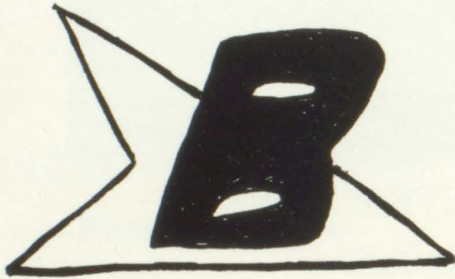
